



Student Right-to-Know Act

The Student Right-to-Know Act, also known as the "Student Right-to-Know and Campus Security Act" (P.L. 101-542), was passed by Congress November 9, 1990. Title I, Section 103, requires institutions eligible for Title IV funding to calculate completion or graduation rates of certificate- or degree-seeking, full-time students entering the institution, and to disclose these rates to all students and prospective students.

In addition to the graduation rates of students, Stone Academy complies with other reporting requirements of the Federal Right-to-Know and Campus Security Act. This information can be found on our website and in our catalog.

The following data represents all full-time, first-time certificate/degree-seeking undergraduate students who completed their program of study and program requirements within 150% of normal time to complete their program.
